Music Resources to support the teaching of Curriculum Music.



Introduction

Building up the resources to facilitate the delivery of a well structured, practical music curriculum takes time and money, and will consequently need to be addressed year on year as part of your subject development plan. Instruments are fragile too – and need constant monitoring for repair and replacement. A budget needs to take consumables (such as batteries, beaters, repairs) as well as 'new' resources into consideration.

This has been written to support Primary School Music Subject Leaders to evaluate what resources they need in order to deliver their curriculum music. It is divided into 4 sections: EYFS, KS1, LKS2, & UKS2. It links to our Skill Progression Document ensuring that all aspects of the Skill Progression document are supported by appropriate resources.

Resources need to be easily accessible and available – consider how you will store your resources and make sure multiple classes can have access if that's how the timetable is organised.
